### National Indigenous Peoples Day

Land Acknowledgement: We acknowledge that the City of Pickering resides on land within the Treaty and traditional territory of the Mississaugas of Scugog Island First Nation and Williams Treaties signatories of the Mississauga and Chippewa Nations. Pickering is also home to many Indigenous persons and communities who represent other diverse, distinct, and autonomous Indigenous nations. 
Will the Free Waterfront Shuttle Service be running again this summer? I loved being able to commute and not fuss with parking down there!



YES! The Waterfront Route on Durham Region Transit Bus 100 will be returning!

- Service Dates: Weekends and statutory holidays (June 28 -September 1, 2025).
- Specific Dates: This includes June 28, 29, July 1 (Canada Day), August 2, 3, 4 (Civic Holiday), and September 1 (Labour Day).
- Route: The shuttle operates on Durham Region Transit Route 100, connecting Pickering City Centre to the waterfront.
- **Frequency:** The shuttle runs every 20 minutes on a loop.
- Operating Hours: 12 pm to 9 pm.
- Fare: Free for Route 100 only; standard fares apply for other routes.



## OLG Cheque Presentation June 13, 2025



During Ribfest weekend, the City of Pickering proudly marked the transformative impact of its partnership with Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation (OLG) at the popular Ribfest event presented by Rotary Club of Pickering.

Since the opening of the Pickering Casino Resort in 2021, the City has received over \$59.5 million in non-tax gaming revenue through its Municipality Contribution Agreement with OLG. For the 2024–2025 fiscal year alone (April 1, 2024 to March 31, 2025), Pickering received \$17,167,711 in revenue - representing a major investment in the city's

future.

Highlights from the 2025 Capital and Current Budgets show over \$23.5 million in projects funded by casino revenues, including:

- Dunbarton Pool roof and structure replacement
- · Construction of outdoor pickleball courts
- Land acquisition and design for Fire Station #5
- Fixtures and equipment for the Pickering Heritage Community Centre
- Community grants to local non-profit organizations

#### See It? Report It.



You've probably seen the signs in your neighbourhood, on roadsides, and near parks and trails. The City has installed these signs as part of its anti-littering campaign.

Dumping waste where it doesn't belong harms plants and wildlife, fosters rodent infestations, and results in significant cleanup costs. Penalties can be up to \$25,000 for an individual, and \$100,000 for a corporation.

The City conducts proactive patrols to deter illegal dumping. However, as these incidents continue to escalate, we need your support.

# Durham Region Health Department Begins 2025 West Nile Virus Surveillance & Tick Prevention Program

Durham Region Health Department will begin West Nile virus (WNV) surveillance and control program for the 2025 season on May 12. This program includes adult mosquito trapping to test for WNV, surveillance for larval mosquito activity, and administering larvicide in catch basins and surface water sites throughout Durham Region.

#### **BLACKLEGGED TICKS HAVE BEEN FOUND IN THIS AREA**

The bite of an infected tick can spread serious diseases to humans and pets



Use a bug repellent with DEET or Icaridin



Walk in the centre of trails



Wear light-coloured clothing - long sleeves, long pants and closed footwear



Check your full body, including your children and pets for ticks. Shower when you get home to help find ticks that may be attached to your body



Carefully remove any attached ticks

- Read the City's Lobbyist Registry By-law and determine if you are a Lobbyist;
- 2. Create an Online Profile to register as a Lobbyist; and,
- 3. Declare lobbying activity within 10 business days of initial lobbying activity.

The Lobbyist Registry is up and running, and it is now mandatory for those that lobby Public Officer Holders. The team from the Clerks Department has played a lead role in not

only preparing the Lobbyist Registry By-law, but also the tools that will assist Public Office Holders and Lobbyists to understand the definition of a **Public Officer Holder**.
