EDITORIAL

The media is paid to publish and broadcast the news. We expect it to be objective and neutral in its reporting, though some bias is inevitable no matter how hard objectivity is sought.

What actually gets reported deserves scrutiny. Revenue and profit top the media's priorities, and reporting whatever attracts an audience follows close behind. Violence, crime, disaster, and crisis sell best, so they get reported most. Gun crime and street violence are worked from appetizer to main course. Nothing pulls in viewers like violence, aggression, and bloodshed. Networks flash a token warning that footage "may be graphic" — then air it anyway, because graphic sells. Dignity and decency don't factor in. If it attracts an audience, it runs.

That disregard for impact is the real failure. Children exposed to this kind of coverage can absorb it as normal — even acceptable — adult behaviour. So can older viewers, the emotionally vulnerable, and anyone less equipped to put graphic footage in context. The effect isn't just perception, either: research links sensationalized coverage to a measurable rise in violence and aggression in the days that follow.

Gore attracts viewers. Viewers drive profit. So the industry reports more gore, each cycle more gruesome, with barely a thought for what it does to the people watching. It carries no responsibility, no obligation to society — only the bottom line. Profit trumps people. Pennies be damned when dollars can be had.

Society has few levers to pull. Letters and petitions mostly land on deaf ears. Politicians keep their distance — reining in the press reads as political interference, so they avoid it even when it's warranted. But if government and industry leaders won't act, who will?

The answer may be the audience itself. News consumers need to push back directly — telling politicians and media leaders when coverage crosses from informative into gratuitous. Profitability should not be the only test of what is fit to broadcast.

What I know about the Election campaign

Mayoralty race: Kevin Ashe, Doug Cornell, Shaun Rickard, Lisa Robinson

Ashe is the incumbent with many years of experience in Pickering politics, following in his father's footsteps. I know nothing about Cornell or Rickard and have not heard any alarm bells of any sort associated with either one. Lisa Robinson is well known to anyone who has listened to Pickering news information. She is a councillor who is in the center of a swirling storm of controversy and turmoil. Very outspoken, Robinson states her mind, claiming what she says is 'the truth' regardless of its impact or effect in the community and in Pickering Council.



Ward 1

Maurice Brenner should be isolated from the pack as he is not running for regular councillor, rather for *regional councillor*. The rest, Blair, Mir, Nye, Samlalsingh, Steinhausen, and Vadivel are fresh blood. None has anything noteworthy that would detract from their being a candidate to consider.

Ward 2

Incumbent councillors, Shaheen Butt and Dave Pickles have one competitor currently, Nada Raykumar. Again no glaring problems with any of these candidates with Pickles having the most experience as Councillor of all of these candidates.

Trustees - Public

Same story, trustees are elected officials but who knows the work they do. The candidates are: Andre De Freitas and Ayeza Perez.



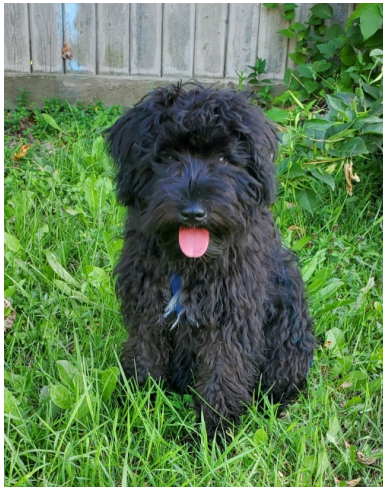
They are millions of people in the world who wish they had a say in their governments as do those who have a vote. Every citizen in Canada of voting age, has that right.

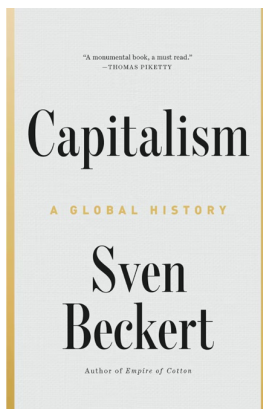


Heavy reading

As you likely know my favourite authors write adult fluff, crime thrillers that entertain and engage rather than educate and elucidate. I read at bedtime for about half an hour or so, every night. In any case, recently I was thinking I am reading all this fluff and enjoying it but I questioned what I was getting out of this reading. [You can see the long list of books I have read at “[Richard Reviews](#)” I thought I am not getting much out of these books other than reading pleasure.

So I decided to ‘learn’ something with my reading. I chose a tome that would enlighten me. Here’s the story.



It feels like being back in graduate school...mental exertion....

An excellent narrative that unravels the defining story of the past thousand years.

No other phenomenon has shaped human history as decisively as capitalism. It structures how we live and work, how we think about ourselves and others, how we organise our politics. Sven Beckert situates the story of capitalism within the largest conceivable geographical and historical framework in this fascinating new book.

Capitalism, argues Beckert, was born global. Emerging from merchant communities across Asia, Africa and Europe, capitalism's radical recasting of economic life rooted itself only gradually. Then it burst onto the world scene, as European states and merchants built a powerful alliance that would propel them across the oceans. This epic drama corresponded at no point to an idealised dream of free markets. All along, state-backed institutions and imperial expansions shaped its dynamics.

Capitalism decentres the European perspective, highlighting agency, resistance, innovation and ruthless coercion around the world through to the present with the rise of Asian economies, particularly China. Sven Beckert doesn't merely add up capitalism's debits and credits in this monumental book, but allows us to think afresh about the past to help us re-imagine the future.

Richard adds

Professor Beckert writes in a style that is erudite and elevated beyond my normal reading level. The language is very sophisticated and complex, very advanced and polished to a level that becomes as somniacal as Sominex or a 100 year old brandy. This is not bedtime reading and if it weren't for years of teaching history, it would be impossible reading. But my years as a history teacher have begun dividend payment. I am familiar with much of the times he writes about making the demanding reading easier to follow and understand. Nevertheless, it is tough bedtime reading. Far from fluff.

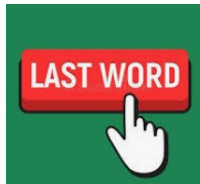
