

After a 28-year career in municipal politics, 19 of which spent as Pickering's longest serving mayor, Mayor Dave Ryan announced at last night's City Council meeting that he has decided to officially retire at the end of this term of office when the new Council is sworn in on November 21st.

For nearly three decades, Mayor Ryan has provided strong, steady, progressive, and visionary leadership helping Pickering evolve from a little bedroom community into a dynamic, diverse, thriving, and sustainable city.

During his mayoralty, the City has seen many key and transformational projects come into realization, including the Frenchman's Bay Harbour Entrance reconstruction; new Fire Headquarters; the world's longest enclosed pedestrian bridge; Durham Live; securing \$7.8M in non-tax gaming revenue for the City via Pickering Casino Resort; Seaton; world-class businesses relocating to the Innovation Corridor; Canada's largest filming backlot; Pickering Soccer Centre; the expansion of high-speed broadband across the city; the state-of-the art Operations Centre; the Durham College/Centennial College Joint Learning Centre; the Mayor's Gala raising \$2.6M for the Ajax-Pickering hospital; the Canadian Centre for Nuclear Sustainability; and the Jerry Coughlan Health & Wellness Centre, to name a few.

In addition to the quote below, Mayor Ryan has penned a fulsome and heartfelt 'open letter to residents', which can be read in the digital edition of Pickering's Your City Magazine <u>here</u>.

"It has been an absolute honour and privilege to serve the residents, businesses, community groups, and stakeholders of this great city. Looking at Pickering's evolution, I can't help but marvel at all that we have accomplished together.

This was not an easy decision to make, as my heart and soul is still fully invested in our community. However, I am at peace with my decision to step down, as I am fully confident that my Colleagues on Council, our CAO, and dedicated staff will continue the leading work we are doing in building a more modern, vibrant, progressive, and inclusive city.

I have so many fond memories to look back on, but what truly made my time as mayor special was getting to know so many of you. I have enjoyed all of our interactions, chats, discussions, and meetings that we've shared, whether it was in a boardroom, at a community event, shopping at a local store, or just out in the community. However, they were very persistent in their efforts, and increasingly, I felt an obligation to answer the call of civic duty. With Anne's support I agreed to run for Council, but unfortunately lost that first try. However, with the continued encouragement of the community I ran successfully in 1994, and again in 1997 and 2000. In 2003, I retired from a 33-year career at IBM when I was voted in as Mayor. With your support I have served in that capacity for 5 consecutive terms and over 19 years. THANK YOU!

This all began, because my family and I had an emotional investment in this place we called home. We actively participated in our community and paid attention to and engaged in issues that we felt were important

I want to thank you and encourage you and your neighbours to become actively engaged in die civic discourse and more importantly, take the time to vote. I cannot overstate the importance of voting, and I believe that we have a personal obligation to exercise this fundamental democratic right Each of us makes a difference in the fabric of our community either by what we do or don't do.

I want to make a special call out to our diverse communities and those equity-seeking individuals to become actively involved in municipal government by either joining a municipal committee or running for Council_ City Hall needs to better represent the community it serves and with your active involvement, it can 'Pickering Proud' is not just a slogan to me It embodies everything that has energized me, motivated my commitment, and anchored my resolve Over the years, you, my Council colleagues, and the wonderful Pickering staff have embarked on an epic journey that has seen our home, our Pickering, evolve from a suburban town, and a little bedroom community into an active, thriving, ambitious city looking to the future.

The Declaration of Emergency has been lifted in Pickering, and our Facilities are fully Open. Our long-awaited renovation of the Chestnut Hill Development Recreation Centre is complete and an official ribbon cutting will take place on *May 14th*, *10:30 am*.

The long-awaited NEW Pickering Pickering Animal Shelter is in the final planning stages. Designs will be completed later this year followed by a groundbreaking. The Shelter will be a state-of-the art facility for the temporary housing of lost and abandoned pets and rehousing through adoption. It will be a showplace focusing on sustainability such as geothermal heating, solar power generation, green roof and all-wood construction. The interior will include socialization zones to enable assessments of cats, a stimulation area for dogs including exercise runs along with education/training rooms providing forums on topics such as responsible pet ownership.

Political Stuff

Canadian campaign rallies..."how to sit on your hands..."



Political campaigns have changed since the days of Mackenzie King, Laurier and John A. But in many ways they have not: people assemble, hopes and expectations rise, candidates delay and stall entry to build anticipation, excitement, energy, and expectation. And the pffft...the hot air leaks out of the political balloon.

The crowd Pierre Poilievre political campaign rally at the City of Pickering's recreation centre filled the meeting hall, about 2000 people, a decent crowd for a Friday night in small city Ontario. Media from CBC and Metroland News were trolling the crowd like media sharks hunting for sound bites.



Finally, a lead-off speaker, in this case, failed local federal Conservative candidate, Jacob Mantle, looking like a time traveler from the past, Haight-Ashbury, Woodstock perhaps. Mantle introduced the next speaker, local provincial Conservative MP, Collin Carrie.

Colin Carrie stumped out a few campaign promos to recruit more members for the Conservative Party, electors who will determine its next leader. Then, "without further adieu...." Your next Prime Minister, Pierre Poilievre."





Pierre Poilievre is arguably the front runner for the leadership of the federal Conservative Party. His closest rival, Jean Charest's expiry date may be passed. The other leadership hopefuls, though none should be dismissed, are not likely to obtain enough votes to displace Poilievre and Charest but one can treat unlikely possibilities lightly in politics.

Poilievre has demonstrated a chameleon-like political face. He has been placed on both ends of the political spectrum, left and right. He has even been touted as Canada's version of Donald Trump.

Regardless of political labels, political spectrum positioning, Poilievre is a seasoned political pro. He has been around for years now, almost decades. Yet he looks young, energetic, firesh and charismatic. He seems to really have a winning image. But....other strong candidates with 'winning images' were unexpectedly shocked with losses in their leadership bids....Peter MacKay, Maxime Bernier. A pro like Poilievre knows not to assume anything in a political campaign.

Poilievre's speech contained the expected tropes of any 2022 political campaign: inflation, rising food costs, unreachable housing prices, gas prices, rising cost of living. Understandably Poilievre emphasized national issues rather than local ones but the content of what he said was not as important as its delivery. In that regard, Poilievre is a master.




A curious observation: the crowd sat on its hands for much of this rally, particularly when the political leader failed to begin the rally punctually. Ten minutes, 15, 25... finally thirty minutes late, Poilievre took to the stage. Meanwhile, one lone person clapped a criticism but ignored by the crowd or maybe ostracized as being a nut-bar. A sad commentary on the acquiescence and submissiveness of Canadian voters.




Jody Wilson-Raybould: "Indian" in the Cabinet: Speaking Truth to Power


